Howard Ionascu

Howard joined Exeter Philharmonic Choir as Director of Music in 2017. A professional conductor, specialising in choral music, he has led the choir in performing many major works with leading orchestras, ensembles and soloists in Exeter Cathedral and elsewhere.

After a degree in music at Manchester University, Howard joined Wells Cathedral Choir as a professional singer. His move into choral conducting began in 1997 when he founded The Laudate Choir in London, He is also Music Director and Conductor of Twickenham Choral.

Howard has a long association with music education, having led departments at some of the UK's finest educational establishments. He directed the choirs at Winchester College, King's Canterbury and the Junior Royal Academy of Music.

Stephen Tanner



A freelance choral director, organist, composer and arranger, Stephen ioined Exeter Philharmonic Choir as Associate Director of Music in 2017. He is also the choir's accompanist and directs its Pilgrims' Chorus, which makes annual expeditions giving choral concerts while walking

Stephen graduated in Music from the University of Huddersfield. For many years he was Director of Music at Exeter Cathedral School, and Assistant Organist and Director of Girl Choristers at Exeter Cathedral.

His musical interests are wide and he has a particular affinity for jazz. Stephen directed our 'Sacred Jazz' concert in 2022, including his new composition, Jazz Te Deum and Jubilate Deo. He will direct our second concert of Jazz for a Summer Evening next June.



Darest thou now, O soul. Walk out with me toward the unknown region, Where neither ground is for the feet nor any path to follow?'

These words of Walt Whitman, opening his poem *Toward the* Unknown Region, aptly conjure up the exciting challenges of our new season, featuring 'firsts' and fresh new music as well as more familiar repertoire.

Our season opens in November with a world première performance of a newly commissioned work by Cecilia McDowall: The Weather Book. The concert also includes Poulenc's magnificent *Gloria* and Brahms' Alto Rhapsody, as well as Vaughan Williams' atmospheric setting of Whitman's Toward the Unknown Region.

In contrast, our Carols in the Cathedral on 16 and 17 December will as usual feature glorious Christmas music, performed by two trumpets, soprano, choir and organ, with audience participation for some familiar carols.

Handel's oratorio, Solomon, in the spring will be another 'first' performance for the choir. Although the 'Arrival of the Queen of Sheba' in the final act will be recognisable to many, this work is rarely performed in its entirety. Handel's masterpiece brings to life a compelling story about the deeds and wisdom of King Solomon.

The choir's final event of the season in June offers Jazz for a Summer Evening, featuring a trio of piano, bass and drums, Almost a 'first' (our previous jazz concert took place in 2022), it will again be directed by Associate Director Stephen Tanner.

We look forward to welcoming you all very soon!

Exeter Philharmonic Choir is proud to launch its 2025/26 season with the world première of a new choral work, *The Weather Book*, by one of the UK's leading composers, Cecilia McDowall. This explores aspects of the history of weather and meteorology – appropriately for the city that is home to the world-renowned Met Office!

Coincidentally, as we approached Cecilia McDowall to compose a work for us, the Gustav Vasa Chamber Choir in Stockholm had also asked her to write a short piece for them. The result was a joint commission – a brand-new work, entitled *The Weather Book*, in three movements.

Cecilia's inspiration for the commission was to link the UK and Sweden through references to climate. She worked with poet and librettist Kate Wakeling to discover different aspects of weatherrelated topics. The first movement, 'Celsius Rising', was written for the Swedish choir, who performed it in Stockholm in March. Cecilia then wrote the second and third movements, 'History of Air' and 'The Weather Book', for Exeter Philharmonic Choir, and we will have the honour of performing the world première of the entire work on 8 November.

Cecilia will lead a pre-concert talk about her composition at 6.30 pm, at the Devon and Exeter Institution, 7 Cathedral Close, Exeter. Admission is free, but tickets are very limited and must be booked with concert tickets.



Programme In addition to Cecilia McDowall's new commission, the concert also includes four other wonderful pieces of music.

Johannes Brahms Tragic Overture

Bristol Ensemble will open the concert with Brahms' *Tragic Overture.* This is one of a pair of overtures (the other being the *Academic Festival Overture*) written by Brahms in 1880, to thank Breslau University for his award of an honorary doctorate.

Ralph Vaughan Williams Toward the Unknown Region

Vaughan Williams' setting of Walt Whitman's poem, 'Toward the Unknown Region', was composed in 1906 and first performed at the Leeds Festival the following year. It reflects the spirit of adventure felt by an explorer on a journey of discovery.

Johannes Brahms Alto Rhapsody

Brahms composed his *Alto Rhapsody* in 1869, based on text from Goethe's poem, 'Harzreise im Winter'. In it, the alto soloist depicts the agonies of a despairing recluse, wandering through the Harz Forest, until a four-part chorus finally brings comfort with a shared prayer to the 'Father of Love'.

Francis Poulenc Gloria

Poulenc's ever-popular *Gloria*, a setting of text from the Latin Mass, was written in 1959. In its six short movements, soloist, choir and orchestra display many musical contrasts, ranging from solemnity, through lyricism, to pure joy.



Cecilia McDowall Composer

Cecilia McDowall (b. 1951) is a leading British composer of sacred and secular choral music. Her compositions have been commissioned and performed by many organisations, including the BBC Singers, The Sixteen and London Mozart Players.

In 2020 Cecilia was presented with the Ivor Novello Award for a 'consistently excellent body of work'. She was awarded a commission by King's College, Cambridge, to write the carol for the 'Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols', broadcast worldwide on Christmas Eve 2021.

She holds honorary doctorates from the Universities of Portsmouth and West London and an Honorary Fellowship of the Royal School of Church Music.



Agnes Auer Soprano

We are delighted to welcome Swedish soprano Agnes Auer, who in March was the soloist for 'Celsius Rising' in Stockholm, to sing the entire new work with the choir.

Retiring

High drama and majestic wealth set the scene for Handel's oratorio, Solomon.

Although the story is compelling and the music sublime – just think of the 'Arrival of the Queen of Sheba' - the work is rarely performed in its entirety. Indeed, no record has been found of any full performance in Exeter Cathedral since Handel composed the work in 1748.

Exeter Philharmonic Choir will therefore be delighted to welcome to the Cathedral Martha McLorinan as the wise King Solomon; Amy Carson, doubling as his Queen and the Queen of Sheba; Nick Pritchard as Zadok the Priest; and Timothy Dickinson as the Levite. Complementing the action will be Endelienta Barogue and the full choir, singing in eight voice parts.

Holy Trinity Church in sunny Exmouth must be the ideal place to enjoy jazz on a summer evening.

Associate Director of Music Stephen Tanner has devised an inspiring programme for the choir and a jazz trio of piano, bass and drums.

Bob Chilcott composed A Little Jazz Mass in 2004 for a choral festival in the home of jazz, New Orleans. It blends five movements of the traditional Latin Mass with the jazz idiom.

In 2022, composer lain Farrington had a very different inspiration for writing Then Sing We All. He explains: 'After the pandemic in 2020-21 and the forced closure of group choral singing, I wanted to express the joy that we experience when singing together.' He chose medieval verses that reflect the simple pleasures of singing, interpreted through the sound world of jazz.

Founded in 1846, the choir sang its first concert, Handel's *Messiah*, in 1847. Since then we have given concerts in Exeter every year, without interruption, despite world wars and the recent pandemic. Quite a record!
